What is trinket trading?

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It's a playful faire tradition where people trade tiny treasures like baubles, charms, pins, or coins. It brings a dash of whimsy, a sprinkle of story, and a lot of smiles.

This guide is just that: a guide, not law! Use your best judgment, and be safe, kind, and thoughtful.

What makes a good trinket?

 \checkmark Small, fun, and safe to carry \checkmark

 \checkmark No food or glass \checkmark

√ Handmade is lovely,
but not required √

✓ Keep it simple - only bring what you'd happily trade for a rock! ✓ •••••

Who can trade?

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Anyone who wants to!

Kids, grownups, merchants, performers - if someone's wearing an **orange ribbon** or **trader symbol**, they're in. (Always ask a guardian before trading with a child.)

How do I find other traders?

At WRF and ORF, you'll mostly see **orange ribbons**, but some folks wear **the trader symbol** too.



At other faires, look for the trader symbol - that's the universal sign for "let's trade!"

Can I just give trinkets away?

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Absolutely! Trinket gifting is part of the fun.

Tips and coin are still the best way to support performers, but a trinket can be a sweet gesture.

If you're offered a trade and choose not to take a trinket, always leave one in return.

Can I trade with merchants?

Sometimes! But:

Look for a ribbon, symbol, or sign at their booth. If you don't see any of these, then the merchant is not participating.

Don't interrupt a sale or customer conversation.

Never ask to trade for something they're selling - trinkets are for trinkets only!



Give with generosity, receive with grace.

That's the heart of trinket trading.
